

Assalamo Alaikum - Peace be with you.



A SHORT HISTORY OF MWA

Madam President, Director, of The Islamic Cultural Centre, Guests, Sisters and Brothers in Islam, Assalaamu Alaikum

It is indeed a great honour for me to be addressing you on this the 25th Anniversary of the Muslim Women's Association.

As I look around and I hope I am not giving away any age secrets, I can see at least three ladies who attended the third meeting in June 1962. Two of whom are still active members of the Association. From our visual display you will see that we had ten Presidents. Begum Ikramullah being the first, followed by Princess Layla Fatima of Morocco to our present, President Mrs. Khanum Hassan.

From the very beginning we have never been just a group of women passing a couple of hours chatting over a cup of tea. No! we were active in our caring for others.

Many individuals and organisations received our help in cash and kind. From the war-torn zone of Algeria to the floods in Chittagong and from the Palestinian and Afghan refugees to another war torn zone, Lebanon. The list is too enormous.

One of our busiest times was after the 1967, 6 day war in the Middle East. When we were sending tons of clothes to the refugees in Jordan, through the generosity of Princess Dine and the Royal Jordanian Airlines.

Recently we have had two different kinds of donations. We were one of the sponsors of a young man who had recovered from a brain tumour, and walked from John O'Groats to Land's End, to raise funds for a brain scanner.

The other was a pupil from our first Islamic weekend Class. He was the leader of a group of six young men on a scientific research expedition of Greenland. We have had the pleasure of seeing the most wonderful slides taken by him, portraying at times some of the dangers they encountered.

In 1976, our caring has caused us to have a Sponsorship Scheme which is co-ordinated through the Save The Children Fund. We are happy to say, that the first two boys we sponsored through secondary school are grown young men who do not need our support any more. (Some of the letters from our children are displayed outside). At present we are sponsoring eight families in Lebanon and one in Pakistan.

Seeing the need of the unfortunate Muslim children in this country, we launched our plans in 1964 for an orphanage - the newspapers around the world talked of the "New Style Orphanage" the Muslim Women's Association was planning in London. It took us many years to establish the Home which is named Madina House, as our community was not aware of the need of such a home. Alhumdullila in 1981, through the great generosity of friends, here and abroad, of organisations, and the unceasing effort of our members - Madina House became a reality. Once the building was bought everything that was needed to make it a 'Home' such as, carpets, curtains, furniture and kitchen equipment were all donated by a few of Muslim Women's Association members.

To date 50 children have passed through our home. 50 children who could have been lost to the faith. In 1967 our Association started an Islamic weekend class in Forest Gate, with the kind assistance of three of the local residents, (two of whom are here this evening). The second was opened in Ealing and the third in Battersea. This education scheme gained momentum and needed full-time staff, which the MWA could not provide, so the project was adopted by the Islamic Cultural Centre in 1969. And now has developed into a prosperous and efficient system of Islamic Education throughout Britain. Among us are a few pupils from that first school.

To keep members informed of MWA activities a Newletter was launched in 1969 and was later developed into our monthly magazine "The Muslim Women". It has maintained a high standard in its articles which cover all aspects, from important issues such as 'The rights of Women in Islam' to World events and special pages for health, Junior Corner and Religious Information.

Our activities and interests are not only confined to the Muslim Women's Association but to many other organisations. In 1964, MWA was the first female organisation to be represented at the FOSIS Annual Conference. Our then Secretary was given a chance to say a few words to the predominately male audience. In 1973 our President was a member of the inaugural meeting of The Islamic Council of Europe and was elected to the executive committee. A position held by successive Presidents. Another first by the MWA came in 1978 when our then President became the first female to be elected on the Union of Muslim Organizations' executive committee. A position held by our present President.

Our liaison with the women's Council and the Arab Women's Council begun in the early 80's and I am happy to say our Associations still work very closely together. Members are asked from time to time to give lectures to other organisations, such as the Women Police Constables in Wiltshire, students in Leicester, Christian Missionaries in Plaistow, and one on International Women's Day at a school in Bethnal Green. We like to think that we are contributing to an understanding of Islam and to better relations within our society here and abroad.

On the International scene, a talk was given by one of our members at an International Muslim Women's Conference in Holland, we were represented at an Interfaith seminar in Kublenz, and at an International Conference in Paris, to mention a few. All through the years some of the MWA members became our welfare group, visiting the sick in their homes and in hospital, visiting women in prison and counselling those with problems. The range of their work is extensive.

On the lighter side, there was much joy in organising the sale of tea on the occasion of the Eids . A welcoming cup on those cold winter days. Also organising such events as Milad and Miraj functions, Fashion shows, as 'Keep up to date the Islamic way', Tea and Dinner parties and Art Exhibitions etc.

The Islamic Cultural Centre has been our 'Home' from the establishment of The Muslim Women's Association 25 years ago, so we feel as part of it. We had a short spell away from here when

the new Mosque was being built. Our dear brothers at FOSIS kindly gave us the use of the premises at the Muslim Student Centre and Hostel, at Kilburn for our meetings and other functions. On the completion of this centre we returned Home'.

The past 25 years of the Muslim Women's Association have been successful only through the enthusiasm and dedication of our members. All the work that has been put into such projects as Madina House and for raising money to help fellow Muslims in need, has been purely voluntary, indeed the whole Association is run on a voluntary basis.

As a registered charity we depend on the generosity of others to achieve our aims and continue in our work 'fisabilillah'.

I have mentioned that some of our members who were the backbone of our Association in the early years are here this evening, with us also are some of their children, some of whom, Alhamdolillah, have shown the same interest and enthusiasm as their parents. So I feel confident that the future of the Association is safe in the capable hands of our youngsters, who will continue to work in the way of Islam.



Address from the Secretary MWA


Assalamo Alaikum






Mrs. Khanam Hassan, President MWA, addressing the guests.






